### **NEWS BRIEFS**

#### **CHADLEY JAMES AWARDED THE BENIAMIN MENDELSONH YOUNG VCTIMOLOGIST AWARD**

Congratulations to Chadley James for being awarded the Benjamin Mendelsohn Young Victimologist Award at the 15<sup>th</sup> International Symposium of the World Society of Victimology (WSV) which was held from 5 – 9 July 2015 in Perth, Australia. The Benjamin Mendelsohn Young Victimologist Award is presented in remembrance of the famous pioneer of Victimology, Benjamin Mendelsohn, to a young Victimologist who has made promising contributions to Victimology.

#### **UNIVERSITY OF CAPE TOWN NRF SOUTH AFRICAN RESEARCH CHAIR IN SECURITY AND JUSTICE**

Prof Mark Shaw has taken up the NRF South African Research Chair in Security and Justice at the University of Cape Town. The Chair was previously held by Prof Clifford

Shearing who is now leading the Global Risk Governance Programme, in the Law Faculty, University of Cape Town, hosted by the Institute for Humanities in Africa (HUMA). Research hubs include Environmental Security; Development and Risk which comprise of an active social responsibility hub focused on supporting women in leadership positions, within the environmental NGO sector.

### **PROF SCHOEMAN VISITS INDIA AND LONDON**

As part of her research and development Prof Marelize Schoeman visited Bangalore and Delhi in India and London in the UK. During the visit she had the opportunity to meet with fellow academics and practitioners who work in the field of restorative and child justice. Some of the highlights of her trip to India were a meeting with Mr. Bhuwan Ribhu the son of Mr. Kailash Satyarthi, the 2014 Nobel peace prize winner and founder of the Bachpan Bachao Andolan NGO. She furthermore visited the ECHO Center for Juvenile Justice, Prayas Juvenile Aid Centre and a youth detention centre where children in conflict with the law under the age of 16 years are detained. Another highlight for her was the opportunity to interact with pre- and post-graduate students at various universities in Bangalore and Delhi. During the visit she presented two lectures to students at the National School of Law (Bangalore) and the Indian Law Institute (Delhi) in which the differences between restorative and retributive justice were explored.

She had the privilege of being the keynote note speaker at a seminar hosted by the Centre for Child and Law at the National Law School of India University, Bangalore on 24 March 2015. In her paper titled *Child justice in South Africa* she shared information about the child justice legislative framework as well as some of the successes and challenges experienced with the implementation of the Child Justice Act 75 of 2008. In addition, she presented a paper titled *Law and justice: Exploring questions about justice and fairness* at a seminar on law and justice that was organised by the Faculty of Law, University of Delhi on 27 March 2015. In the paper she focused on the historical context of justice in South Africa and the influence colonisation had on South Africa's justice system.


In London she got the opportunity to visit NGOs that render services to and do advocacy work for the rights of children in conflict with the law such as the Howard League, Khulisa UK and Just for Kids Law. She also met with Jon Collins of the Restorative Justice Council and Mr. Pete Wallis of the Oxfordshire Youth Offending Services. One of the highlights was a visit to the Childs Hill Primary School, a Restorative School in which a restorative justice philosophy underpins all activities at the school.

Finally, Prof Schoeman was part of a discussion panel titled *Combating hate crimes and xenophobia through restorative justice* that was arranged by the Independent Academic Research Studies (IARS) on 13 April 2015 at the School of Orient and African Studies, University of London. ## CONFERENCE, WORKSHOP AND SEMINAR REPORTS

### **INTRODUCTON TO RESTORATIVE JUSTICE AND THE FIELD OF CONFLICT RESOLUTION WORKSHOP, 29, 30 JUNE – 1 JULY 2015, LOMBARDY BOTIQUE HOTEL, PRETORIA**

The SACSSP accredited experiential learning workshop was presented from 29 June to the 1<sup>st</sup> July 2015 by the Unisa College of Law's Restorative Justice Community Engagement project in collaboration with Mr Mike Batley from the Restorative Justice Centre.



*Before I attended the workshop I was of the opinion that restorative justice is an either or approach. But at the end, I learnt that restorative justice can only be successful when applied hand-in-hand with other approaches to crime (i.e. retribution, restitution). The presenter was very knowledgeable and he presented the workshop in an interesting manner by using practical examples and role plays, for example. I thoroughly enjoyed the workshop and I would recommend it to anyone wanting to learn more about restorative justice. Thobane MS*

The purpose of the workshop was to introduce attendees to the field of restorative justice and conflict resolution. It also kicked off the development of a short learning programme in restorative justice that will be presented by the UNISA Centre for Criminological Science from 2017.

The workshop was attended by 17 practitioners from NGOs (NICRO, Khulisa and TLF), social workers and psychologists from the Department of Correctional Services as well as academics from the UNISA College of Law. Attendees were introduced to the concepts of restorative justice (historically, internationally and in South Africa) and its relation to justice, reconsolidation and to alternative dispute resolution. Emphasis was further placed on the application of restorative justice in the criminal justice system.

## **CONFERENCE CONTRIBUTIONS AND PRESENTATIONS**

### **21<sup>ST</sup> CENTURY SECURITY MANAGER AFRICA SUMMIT, 8-10 APRIL 2015, SOUTHERN SUN OR TAMBO INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT, JOHANNESBURG, SOUTH AFRICA**

Mr. Lyon Pretorius attended the summit which was held under the International Security Management Institute (ISMI). ISMI admits more than 1 000 security professionals, annually, to study the Certified Security Management Professional (CSMP®) Accredited Diploma. The CSMP® is the world's leading international security management combined certificate/diploma being studied by professionals from over 100 countries representing seven out of 10 biggest companies in the world.

The summit was focused on the fact that businesses are facing more sophisticated and advanced attacks, more especially those companies and organisations that fall under the banner of critical infrastructure. These include electricity generation, gas production, oil, water supply, telecommunications, and financial services organisations. Taking this heightened risk of attacks against the mentioned organisations into consideration, security management plays a critical core business function.

However, the main challenge for traditional security managers is to keep abreast with the changes occurring in allied fields such as corporate risk management and information security and to adapt their security management skills accordingly. There have been incremental shifts and game-changing forces in this industry and thus security managers are required to enhance their professional skills as well as to improve their security management skills. Effective system security depends on creating a workplace environment and organisational structure where management understands and fully supports security efforts, and users are encouraged to exercise caution. It is therefore the responsibility of the security manager to lead this effort.

The summit has, therefore, pooled experts in security management to showcase and analyse the challenges and successes of their security initiatives within their organisations.

Griffiths, M.L. 2015. *The illegal trade in endangered animals in KwaZulu-Natal, with an emphasis on rhino poaching.* MA Criminology. (Supervisor: Prof F.J.W. Herbig).

**ABSTRACT**

The illegal trade in endangered animals in KwaZulu-Natal, with an emphasis on rhino poaching, is tactically addressed in this dissertation. The aim is to expose the nature and extent of these crimes; the victims, offenders and modus operandi involved; the adjudication of wildlife offences; the causes and consequences concerned; the relevant criminological theories to explain these crimes; and recommendations for prevention. This research intends to examine the contemporary pandemic of rhino poaching in KwaZulu-Natal, South Africa, and offer potential techniques for intervention.

Furthermore, one of the main goals of the study is to reveal and enhance the extremely neglected field of conservation criminology. A general disregard by society for the environment, as well as the overall ineffectiveness and corruption of criminal justice and conservation authorities, comes to the fore. The purpose of the research is therefore to suggest possible prevention strategies in order to protect the rights of endangered species.

#### **CENTRE OF CRIMINOLOGY, UNIVERSITY OF CAPE TOWN**

Berg, J. 2015. Polycentric security governance: Legitimacy, accountability and the public interest. PhD (Criminology). (Supervisor: Prof C. Shearing).

#### **ABSTRACT**

Julie Berg's thesis examines how power is constituted in hybrid polycentric systems of security governance. In particular, the thesis explores how legitimacy – as a form of power – is configured in Improvement Districts in South Africa with a specific focus on three ways by which it is gained – through promoting public participation in decision-making, through policing nodes being transparent and accountable and through the delivery of effective security for the public good. The empirical findings of the thesis show that legitimacy may originate from multiple sources and that state and non-state policing nodes within polycentric security governance systems may undermine, enhance and/or co-produce democratic participation, accountability and security for the public interest. The thesis both challenges the normative tendency to associate democratic legitimacy with the state and contributes to the pressing question of how to theoretically account for the empirical reality of polycentric security governance systems.

<p><b>CALL FOR RESEARCH SUPPORT REGARDING ASSOCIATED ROBBERIES</b></p>
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Ms MS Thobane was interviewed on UNISA radio (18 May), 702 radio (20 July) and Groot FM (23 July) on her DLit et Phil in Criminology study titled *The criminological exploration of associated robberies in South Africa*. Associated robbery is a contemporary modus operandi where bank clients are targeted and robbed before affecting cash deposits or withdrawing large sums of cash from the bank. These

robberies can take place at gunpoint or through being tricked or scammed off the cash. The bank is not affected in the sense of losing money but it suffers reputational risk.

Although scant scientific literature is available on this crime type, this research aims to explore, explain and describe the phenomenon of associated robberies from both the victim's and the offender's point of view. Subject matter experts will also be interviewed. As a result, through one-on-one qualitative semi-structured interviews of the three different subjects mentioned above, the researcher will probe (explore), analyse and describe the phenomenon of associated robberies from multiple views and experiences.

The aim of the interviews was to raise awareness amongst the general public of the crime of associated robbery and to also recruit victims for participation in the study. It is, therefore, the latter reason that Ms Thobane would like to appeal to the CRIMSA members for assistance with her study by contacting her (on 012-433 9523 or [kwadims@unisa.ac.za](mailto:kwadims@unisa.ac.za)) for possible inclusion in the research of any member(s) who might have been a victim of an associated robbery. Members are also encouraged to refer family or any person they know who may have been victimised through the use of the mentioned modus operandi.
